After a year of living apart, St. Francis Children's Center is helping families regain their "pre-pandemic" lives:

 In our Early Education
 Center, new babies are joining our infant rooms and

discovering the world around them; little ones are taking their first steps in our bright, inclusive classrooms; and school-aged children are building sensory, reading, writing and math skills with the support of our caring, masterful teachers.

- At our Family Activity Center, which serves families who have children with special needs, our supportive programming is going on the road! We're moving beyond our walls and into the community where we're needed most. This summer we're providing outdoor, in-person mindfulness and meditation for parents and caregivers; we're getting kids and their families out for play times at local, universally-accessible parks and playgrounds; and we're continuing to host Zoom support groups that link families together from the comfort of their homes.
- And our valuable home visiting programs through Milwaukee County – Birth to Three and Children's Long Term Support – are moving from providing virtual therapies and service coordination to using a hybrid model

combining in-person and telehealth support. This will help families reduce isolation caused by the pandemic.

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
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#### **FAC:** Compassion Resilience Group Returns

intervention services. Following his diagnosis, Noah's B-3 team began forming new ways to help him overcome some of his challenges. They worked with his family to create goals for Noah, including his long-term goal to verbally communicate and short term goals such as eating from his plate. Previously, Noah would only eat certain foods, refused to eat from his plate and would not drink fluids. After working with his B-3 Teacher, Ms. Cheryl, Noah now eats from his plate and drinks fluids as long as he can use a straw. "It's understanding what works. The little things make the biggest difference," Rachel explained.

Today, Noah is a happy toddler who loves hugs, music and drawing! He is working on

mastering how to tie his shoes, is responsive to his environment, continues to work on his verbal communication and is set to graduate from SFCC's B-3 Program this December.

With his B-3 team's support, Rachel and Tiffany were also able to get Noah enrolled into Milwaukee County's Children's Long Term Support (CLTS) Waiver Program where he will continue to receive the services he needs. "Without their [his team's] suggestions and help, we wouldn't have been able to access the resources we have," Rachel said. "And I love that they have always helped me understand his needs."

"He would stack and line up his toys all the time, he would cover his ears or completely not be responsive to his surroundings." # ECE: Lions & Zebras & Dinosaurs, Oh My!

Happy shrieks and giggles can be found all around our building and playgrounds as summer learning is in full swing in SFCC's Early Childhood Education Center! While our doors currently remain closed to the public, we would like to highlight what our students have been up to this summer.

One big change that has taken place since last fall is the reopening of our outdoor playgrounds! For the first time since March 2020, our playgrounds are no longer divided into smaller play spaces, and the students have full access to all of the outdoor play areas. "We are definitely excited to use the outdoor playground, and it's been great to be able to see the kids explore it. For many of them, it's the first time they've ever been on it!" said Ms. Brianna, First Friends Classroom Assistant. As the kids take turns sliding down the slide, we hear the teachers gently remind the students to wait for their friends to get off the slide first. It is a reminder of how new spaces can create new learning opportunities for our young students to practice sharing and self-control.

The practice of sharing and collaborative play (working together) are recurring themes in all of our classrooms. In our Preschool rooms, the students will be practicing their social skills and collaborative play all summer long. It is not an uncommon sight to walk into our either of our Preschool classrooms and see our teachers emphasizing the word sharing. Ms. Jane, Preschool South Teacher, explains, "At this age, they don't quite want to share yet. They struggle with the concept, and we take time to teach them to share and be kind." To reinforce positive behavior, the Preschool classrooms have adopted Kindness Counts, a time during the day when the class takes time to recognize kindness between each other. "It's really a good way for them to practice their social skills, and it helps them understand their actions," said Ms. Therese, Preschool North Teacher.

Meanwhile, our Toddler Classroom will be spending a large part of the summer practicing their use of expressive language through voting. The class will sit once a day to vote on a variety

> of things, according to Ms.

Chelsi, Toddler Classroom Coordinator. "We will practice voting for things such as animals or food with the goal to help them understand why they like and choose certain things," Chelsi said. In the month of June, the Toddler Classroom voted on all things related to the zoo, including lions, tigers, elephants and snakes!

Toddler Classrooms are taking the Summer to practice their comprehension skills by identifying what zoo animals look and sound like. Our youngest students will practice their tactile perception (touching) by locating animal toys hidden in basins filled with shredded paper. Activities like these ensure that the children learn and practice multiple concepts. "They are developing their verbal and non-verbal skills through these activities," Ms. Kerri, ICC Coordinator, explained.

One of the goals of our ECE program is for our students to develop the written and verbal communication skills they need to express their interests by the time they reach Ms. Molly's Pre-K/K5 Classroom. Every month, our kindergarteners take time to journal and vote on subjects they are interested in learning

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#### Remembering Nancy Rosenheimer



We are sad to report that Nancy H. Rosenheimer (nee Dammann), a former staff member of St. Francis Children's Center, passed away on December 21, 2020, at the age of 87 years.

Nancy married Paul Rosenheimer in Madison in 1957. Soon after, the couple moved to the Milwaukee area, where Nancy was a medical technician at St. Mary's Hospital, and Paul worked in the Northwestern Mutual Life Home Office. After one year, Nancy "retired" to raise their three daughters.

When the girls grew up, Paul and Nancy moved to Neenah, WI, where Nancy started working at

a Montessori school. She enjoyed teaching kids so much that she applied for a teacher's aide position at St. Francis Children's Center when the couple moved back to the North Shore of Milwaukee. She worked at SFCC in our preschool classroom for nine years before retiring in 1998.

"Nancy liked that St. Francis Children's Center had kids with special needs as well as children with regular needs," Paul remembered. "She thought it was a really good idea because both groups benefited each other."

Two of Paul and Nancy's grandchildren, Ally and Elena, also attended SFCC. Besides her friends and family, Nancy loved dramatics, interior decorating and gardening, reading mysteries, and occasional games of bridge, tennis and golf.
